In A Remote Place

(Learning From The Cactus)

As evening approached, the disciples came to him and said, This is a remote place, and it's already getting late. Send the crowds away, so they can go to the villages and buy themselves some food. Jesus replied, They do not need to go away. You give them something to eat. - Matthew 14:15-16

We live in a remote place, where food for the soul is scarce. Yet we do not need to go away for nourishment, because the Lamb of God is near, and he nourishes us with the living water and living bread that comes from heaven. It is dark in this world, but we do not need to go someplace else for guidance, because Jesus is with us and he is our light.

This world has so few of its prizes and possessions, yet Jesus reminds us not to pursue them, because instead God has brought us far better things, blessings that will never fade, and even in this world's spiritual droughts and famines, God can satisfy our souls when we walk by faith - *We have here only five loaves of bread and two fish, they answered . . . Taking the five loaves and the two fish and looking up to heaven, he gave thanks and broke the loaves. Then he gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the people. They all ate and were satisfied. - Matthew 14:17-20*

Cactuses live in remote places, deserts where water is scarce. So when God brings them water from heaven, he has prepared them for these times of rain. The cactus does not grow long, thick roots, instead they grow many short, thin, delicate roots, so when it rains they may soak up every drop that falls near them.

When we are weary, we don't need to go someplace else to be renewed, for Jesus has brought the Word near us all. We don't long roots to get spiritual nourishment from a distant place, for God gives his Spirit to those who walk by faith in Jesus. Our Father in heaven simply calls us to keep our hearts soft, fix our eyes on Jesus, and absorb every word that God tells us.

Even in the world's remote places, God never runs out of grace or compassion or understanding, and he pours them out abundantly on those who open our hearts to him - *The disciples picked up twelve basketfuls of broken pieces that were left over. The number of those who ate was about five thousand men, besides women and children. - Matthew 14:20-21*

Cactuses are also equipped with thick, waxy stems, to protect the precious water God gives them, so that it may sustain them in the desert. Likewise, God calls us to treasure his words, to meditate on them. When we ponder God and his words, he will show us blooms of grace in the desert and blossoms of truth in this remote place - just as the beautiful flowers of cactuses reassure us.

But when anyone accepts what he has not seen, believing on the word of his teacher, the faith by which he honors the one his teacher proclaims to him is worthy of great praise.

Blessed, therefore, is everyone who believes the message of the holy apostles who, as Luke says, were eyewitnesses of Christ's actions and ministers of the word. If we desire eternal life and long for a dwelling place in heaven, we must listen to them.
