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## The Lamb Will Be Our Shepherd

*They are before the throne of God and serve him day and night in his temple . . .  
- Revelation 7:15*

We are in the presence of God day and night; he always knows our thoughts and he gives us the spiritual care we need. Day and night our Heavenly Father watches over us and shelters us from spiritual dangers that we couldn't overcome on our own . . . and he who sits on the throne will shelter them with his presence. - Revelation 7:15

Otters are often remembered for their amusing behavior, yet they also show us God's care and understanding in other ways. There are two kinds of otters; some species live along rivers and others live in the seas. Each kind shows us God's splendor in the ways he has designed them. Otters find most of their food at the bottom of the bodies of water where they live, and their metabolism requires them to gather lots of food, so our Creator makes this easier for them.

Otters' lungs are considerably larger than animals of similar sizes, so sea otters can stay under water without breathing as long as 5 minutes as they search for food. River otters can stay submerged even longer, since they can go without breathing for up to 8 minutes. Just as God makes sure otters don't go hungry, he supplies us abundantly with spiritual nourishment through his words and through one another and through the things he has created—*Never again will they hunger; never again will they thirst . . .* - Revelation 7:16

Most (about 90%) sea otters live in the cold waters of the North Pacific ocean. Many river otters also live in places where conditions become frigid during the winter months. So God protects them by giving them the thickest fur of any animal. In a single square inch, an otter has several times more hairs than all the hairs on a human head.

As God protects otters from the cold, our Heavenly Father protects us with his presence from the chill of this world's harshness and emptiness. Then too, God gives us shade from the scorching heat of this world's loudness and uproars . . . *The sun will not beat down on them, nor any scorching heat.* - Revelation 7:16

Sea otters usually spend the day by themselves, but at the end of the day they often come together to form what biologists call a "raft". Dozens or even hundreds of sea otters join themselves with seaweed or link paws with their neighbors, and they float together overnight in the open sea. Similarly, we spend time apart, yet we are still one flock under the care of our heavenly Shepherd; and from time-to-time we can be together to encourage one another with the message of Jesus - *For the Lamb at the center of the throne will be their shepherd.* - Revelation 7:17

The Lamb of God is our good Shepherd, and he is the same yesterday and today and forever.

## A New Heart & A New Spirit

*In Ezekiel 36, God tells us that he will give us a new heart and a new spirit when we realize our need for him and turn to him humbly. This week, Tara Neiswonger writes about the renewal and inner change that God gives us when we turn to him.*

## A Change Of Wholeness

Sitting at the kitchen table this early morning, I catch the sound of birds chattering over ownership of the bird boxes outside the window. Each year after the long grey of Ohio winters, one bright February morning when the sun hints at warm weather but the air still holds to winters chill, these bird families I share space with return with chirps and trills, announcing the return of spring is close. On first the read of Ezekiel 36, I imagine the thought of returning to Jerusalem was like the arrival of spring after a long cold winter.

Ezekiel had been taken into Babylonian captivity, an exile far from Jerusalem and far from the life he may have imagined. His was a time of political upheaval and uncertainty. He writes on the fall of Jerusalem and the promise from God to restore his people to the holy city. Chapter 36 paints a picture of the renewal of the land in preparation of the homecoming. One verse held my attention a bit longer than the others.

Ezekiel writes of the Sovereign Lord saying "I will give you a new heart, and put a new spirit in you, I will remove from you your heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh" v 26.

I found in a quick internet search to several sites the word 'heart' in the Jewish language is more than the muscle that pumps blood or the wellspring of emotion. The heart is one's personality, a place where your sense of the world and how you choose to interact in it lives. It is one's very essence - the seat of where one's attitudes and priorities are birthed. A new heart in this view is a renewed way of interacting with one's world, a renewed way of seeing and understanding and acting out of one's faith. This isn't a change of heart as we phrase it, but a change in the wholeness of oneself through reconciliation to God.
