The Cleveland Avenue Church of Christ, presently located at 2189 Cleveland Avenue, had its beginning November 29, 1942, when it met for its first worship in a rented store front. For five years the church continued to meet in these quarters. In 1947 the basement was constructed at 2189 Cleveland Avenue, and the church worshiped there until the full structure, seating 250, was completed in 1952.

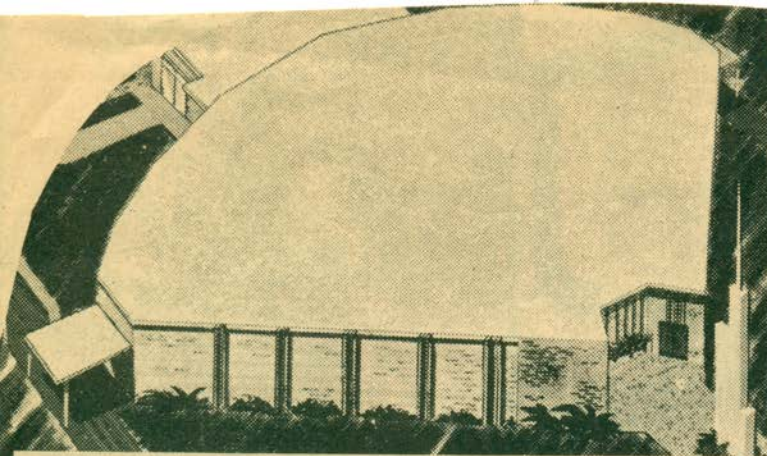
The Cleveland Avenue Church, by 1962, was overflowing. A need for a church in Westerville was realized. Under the leadership of the elders of said church, the Spring Road Church of Christ was constructed, and about forty members moved to that location. The local minister, David Myers, moved to Westerville and worked with the new church.

In 1963, Keith Stotts was employed as the church's minister. In a few months the present quarters were full again. The church began to look for land further north. In May, 1964, the church purchased 7 acres of land at 4581 Cleveland Avenue (just north of Morse Road).

Construction began on a new building in August of 1967. The structure will presently seat 600 in the auditorium, and contains 22 class rooms, 2 offices, and 2 nurseries. The auditorium may eventually seat 2,000. The construction, furnishings, parking lot, and land will cost nearly \$300,000.

The church plans to occupy its new edifice next month.

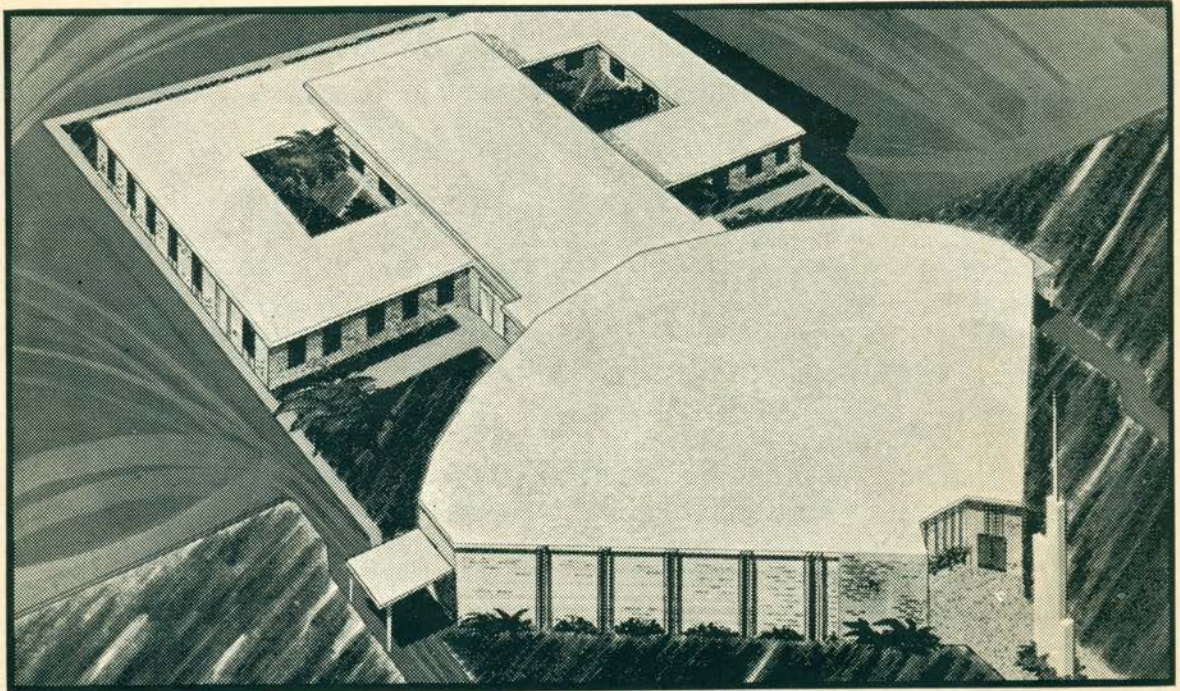

Artist's Concept of New Building

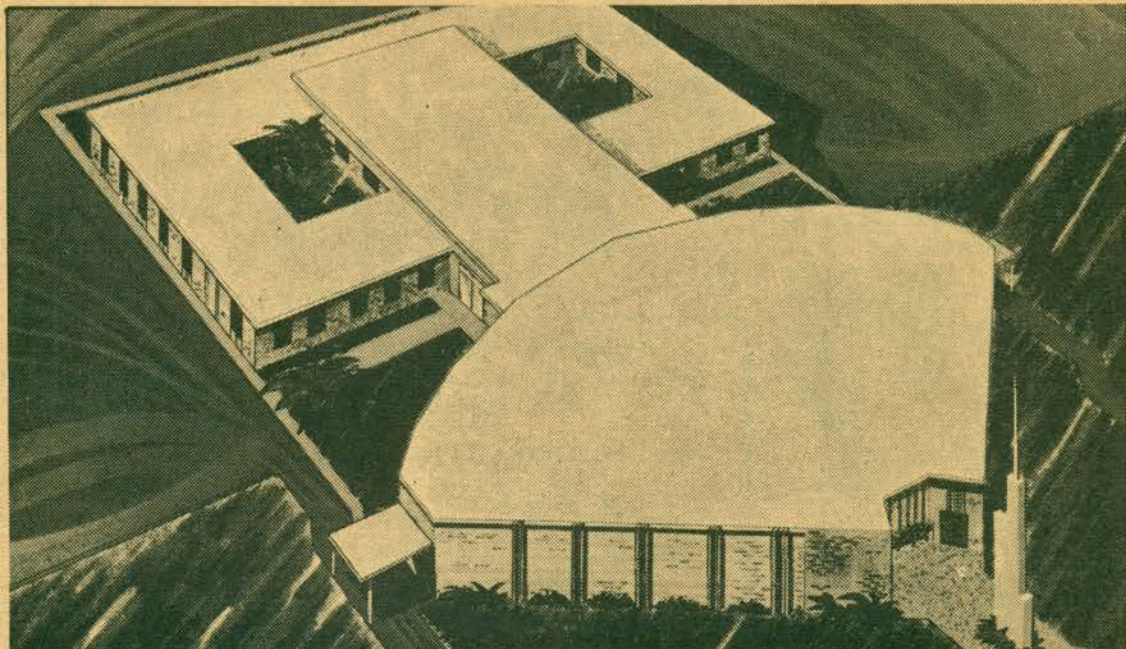

## Start Work On Section Of Church

Ground was broken Sunday for the new church of the Cleveland Ave. Church of Christ.

To be built at 4581 Cleveland Ave., just north of Morse Rd., the \$225,000 structure will be comprised of sanctuary and class rooms, constructed in a pie-shaped pattern.

Keith Stotts, minister of the church, said that work should be completed on the first section within the next eight months. The first stage will consist of a sanctuary seating 600 parishoners and 30 class rooms. Eventually, the building will be expanded to a sanctuary seating 2000 and 100 class rooms.

The church will have a new name when the building is completed. In the future, it will be known as the Northland Church of Christ. The church was started 25 years ago, and has about 220 members now, Mr. Stotts said.

Parking facilities will be behind the building, with the entrance and exit running from Cleveland Ave. The new building is being constructed by Paden Co., Inc. and will have about 17,000 sq. feet of floor space.

The church will be built in three sections. Each section will be an expansion of existing facilities, made by taking some of the room used by classes and converting it into seating for the sanctuary. Then additional class rooms will be constructed.

## Rt. 161 Water Tank Construction Lags

There is a possibility that the 200 million gallon water tank the city is building on Rt. 161 near the Anheuser-Busch brewery may not be completed until next April.

According to Robert Parkinson, assistant water superintendent, the recent construction strike has thrown the project off schedule.

"We still may finish on time, but it will depend on the weather in October and November," Mr. Parkinson said. "We should have the tower in place by then." But he said that if the tower is not in place by then, the project will be delayed.



# Northland Church of Christ To Dedicate New Building

Northland Church of Christ, 4581 Cleveland, will dedicate its new building and hold a series of special meetings starting this Friday and continuing through Mar. 28.

Dwain Evans, minister of the West Islip (Long Island) Church of Christ, will be guest speaker for all events.

Keith Stotts, minister of the Northland Church, extends a special invitation to the public to attend the Mar. 3 dedication at 2:30 pm.

The building to be dedicated represents the first phase of the church's building program since the church moved from 2189 Cleveland Ave. and changed its name from Cleveland Ave. Church of Christ to Northland Church of Christ.

The pie-shaped building contains 22 classrooms, 2 offices and 2 special nurseries, all located around the outer edges of the building. Present seating capacity of the auditorium is 600.

First services in the building were held in July of 1968.

Much of the inside building work was professionally done by members of the church.

Seven-acre site of the new building was purchased in 1964 and construction started in 1967. Value of the building, furnishings, parking lot and land is estimated at \$300,000.

About 500 young people are expected to attend the youth meeting this Friday thru Saturday. Classes, lectures, forums, singing and fun are planned.

An informal class on "Personal Commitment" will be held Mar. 24-28 daily from 9:30 to 11 am.

In accordance with the theme "God's Grace, Man's Salvation", evangelistic meetings will be held this Sunday through Mar. 28, each evening at 7:30.

Speaker and teacher for the series, Minister Evans, is listed in "Outstanding Young Men for 1966". He is a native of the small Texas town of Palmer, having been born there Apr. 3, 1933.

He was educated at Abilene Christian College, Texas Technological College and the graduate school of pastoral counseling at Iona College.

The 35-year-old Christian evangelist is the only minister the West Islip congregation has ever had. He helped conceive the method of recruiting several score of faithful Christian families to move to a mission field simultaneously, beginning not only a new home and work for each other, but a new church.
