
Consider The Lilies...

DOING IT "JUST RIGHT"

You've heard of analysis paralysis, right? Some people are so determined to think through every detail of every possible eventuality that they can only see opportunity in the rear-view mirror. The window of opportunity for many profitable investments, career options, or relationships sometimes closes before she is comfortable with making the move. By the time she determines to act, the time for acting has passed. Thus the dictum *carpe diem*, Latin for "seize the day."

Good judgment is one thing. Prudence and caution before taking a risk is appropriate. But the inability to make a decision and take action is not a virtue.

Then there's the variant of analysis paralysis that I'll call the penchant for perfection. When it is *self*-oriented, this spirit embraces incredibly high and unrealistic standards of performance; it is unable to acknowledge fault or failure. It is the person who must make all As in school, be the top performer in the company, and always be acknowledged to be right in family decisions. Some researches claim a link between the penchant for perfection and depression. Some even link it to a high percentage of suicides.

If the penchant for perfection is *other*-oriented, it imposes unrealistic expectations on the people in one's environment. He can only criticize and find fault with his employees and co-workers; nothing is every so good that he cannot tell the person how it could have been better. In his family, his take on things is that the house is never clean enough, the children never do as well as they could in school, and nobody really deserves praise. These people make other people unhappy and find it hard to keep good employees or to stay married.

God didn't put us here to do everything "just right." He certainly didn't put us here to be one another's monitors and critics. Each of us is imperfect, and the best way to relate to one another is with patience and encouragement.

Admitting our shared imperfection is not an excuse for failure. It isn't meant to keep us from trying. And it certainly isn't whitewash for low standards and puny performance. It is simply acknowledging that we human beings must accept our imperfection and admit that we can't do everything right all the time. It's a plea for our right as humans to learn form our mistakes and continue moving ahead.

It is in our moments of imperfection and failure that God meets us with his grace and empowerment. And you don't want to miss that encounter, do you?

MOUNT ZION & MOUNT ESAU THE BOOK OF OBADIAH

Week Seven A Promise of Deliverance (Obadiah 1:16-18)

In contrast with the message that Edom received from Obadiah, Israel is assured of God's care, and of the eventual victory that God will give to her. Obadiah gives us a revealing look at the ways that God disciplines. God often disciplined his own people, sometimes in ways similar to the means that he would use to discipline Edom, but God never destroyed Israel. Edom, on the other hand, would soon be gone from the earth forever, while God's people would be restored and strengthened.

In these verses, the prophet shifts his emphasis from the denunciations of Edom. God now speaks to his own people (1:16-18), and for the rest of the book, when the prophet says "you", he is addressing the Israelites. And his message to them is one of deliverance from those who oppressed his people. Just as God's people drank of his discipline, and had no choice but to submit to it, so now they shall see their persecutors drink from the same cup.

For Mount Zion (Israel), there will now be deliverance and holiness, and Israel will be better and stronger for having been disciplined. In a spiritual sense, Jacob (Israel) will now be a raging fire that cannot be stopped, certainly not by Edom. Esau (Edom), on the other hand, will be like stubble, the sad and meager remains of a once proud and secure nation. While discipline made Israel stronger, it will leave Edom with no survivors.

Whenever we undergo God's discipline, we should always be thankful that we are being disciplined as Christians, since we can know that God will use it for good in the long run. Hebrews 12:4-11 explains to us that discipline from God is a natural part of the Father/child relationship. That passage also reminds us that discipline is not supposed to feel pleasant at the time. Its value comes in the long run, in the righteousness and spiritual fruit that it produces.

So we should not seek to avoid discipline, but rather should strive to focus our thoughts on God, so that when he does have to discipline us, it will be for a worthwhile, spiritual purpose. The worldly and pagans have no hope, and so every misfortune they suffer is for nothing if they do not use it to turn back to God. But for Christians, "our light and momentary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all" (2 Corinthians 4:17), and "so we fix our eyes not on what is seen, but on what is unseen" (2 Cor. 4:18).
