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An Anchor For Our Souls

God wanted to make the unchanging nature of his purpose very clear to the heirs of what was promised, he confirmed it with an oath. - Hebrews 6:17

The purposes of our Heavenly Father's heart are the same yesterday and today and forever; God's words are true and his promises are trustworthy. God makes those who walk by faith in his Son his own precious children, heirs of eternal life, for he has prepared a place for us in his heavenly dwelling where we may be with him forever. Our Father in heaven gives us a lasting hope that transcends this world's changing appearances and circumstances - *God did this so that . . . we who have fled to take hold of the hope set before us may be greatly encouraged. - Hebrews 6:18*

Writer and nurse Arabella Katherine Hankey (1834-1911, she went by her middle name) is best remembered today for writing the words to the hymn "I Love To Tell The Story". Hankey was active in teaching children's Bible classes and writing about Jesus, until in her 30's when Katherine was stricken by a severe illness, which necessitated her to undergo a lengthy convalescence. She used that time to write a long poem about the story of Jesus and what it means to us.

As Hankey writes, "I love to tell the story Of unseen things above, Of Jesus and His glory, Of Jesus and His love." From this poem, she later chose some excerpts that were set to music as two hymns. Indeed, the story of unseen things above and of Jesus' unfailing love is an anchor for our souls amidst this world's noise and confusion, and the story of Jesus gives us hope all day long - *We have this hope as an anchor for the soul, firm and secure. - Hebrews 6:19*

As Katherine writes, "I love to tell the story, Because I know 'tis true; It satisfies my longings As nothing else can do." Truly God has given us many reasons to believe in the message of Jesus and him crucified and raised, and indeed the Lamb of God came to satisfy the deepest needs of our souls. This world is full of empty promises and false hopes, yet as Hankey writes of the story of Jesus, "More wonderful it seems Than all the golden fancies Of all our golden dreams."

Each one of us is dear to God, he knows each of us by name, and he calls us to put our hope and our faith in Jesus, who has opened the curtain we couldn't have opened so that we may be with our Heavenly Father - *It enters the inner sanctuary behind the curtain, where our forerunner, Jesus, has entered on our behalf. - Hebrews 6:19-20*

Jesus lived as one of us and he bore our pains and our sorrows, and God's grace overflows to those who walk in the light of his Son.

Writer Jennie Hussey began writing poems as a child; she had one of her poems published at age 13, and at 16 her poetry and articles began being frequently published. Later, several dozen of her poems were set to music as hymns; this is the one she is best known for.



As The Mountains Surround Jerusalem . . .

Psalm 125 uses this image of the ways our Heavenly Father surrounds us and protects us and guides us. This week, Mike Paden writes about the spiritual protection that God gives us when we walk by faith in Jesus.

Those Who Trust In The Lord . . .

As believers we read these verses or sing the song because it gives us comfort to know that our God is looking out for us. In the case of "mountains" there are two perspectives, depending on one's relationship with God.

Psalm 125:1-2 affirms that those who trust in the Lord are like Mount Zion, which cannot be shaken, because the Lord protects them as the mountains that surround Jerusalem are her fortifications. The same cannot be said about the wicked, who neither know or fear God (v.3).

Hosea was a prophet to the northern kingdom of Israel who spoke out against the people's iniquity, idolatry and disregard for God. They had set up altars to false gods on the mountains, and God's patience has run its course. As punishment, God foretold of the nation's destruction and when the end is in sight, "Then they will say to the mountains, 'Cover us!' and to the hills, 'Fall on us!'" (Hosea 10:8).

But the mountains surrounding Zion are not the same as the mountains of Samaria. True, but Jesus quotes this Hosea passage to the mourning women as he is carrying His cross toward Golgotha, (Luke 23:26-31). In this passage, Jesus is foretelling the destruction of Jerusalem some forty years in the future. He mourns for them as any compassionate person would, however sad he is, he has no control over their destiny. He has warned them, but their lack of faith means that they will seek shelter in Jerusalem even though it is foreordained to be destroyed. When faced with the Roman invasion they will pray to the mountains to cover them.

Within the same context of Jesus' prophecy about the destruction of Jerusalem from Matthew 24, he warns his followers by saying, when you see the abomination which causes desolation, "Let those who are in Judea flee to the mountains. Let no one on the roof of his house go down to take anything out of the house. Let no one in the field go back to get his cloak" (Matt 24:16-18). I believe Jesus did not want any of His followers to lift a finger to defend Jerusalem.

Whatever we are facing, if our perspective is on following and believing God, we can be comforted in knowing that He will protect us—not necessarily physically, but definitely spiritually. On the other hand, those who reject God do not have that assurance, and at the end of this life, would rather have the mountains fall upon them.

Let us say to non-believers, "Come, let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the house of the God of Jacob. He will teach us his ways so that we may walk in his paths." (Isaiah 2:3).
