## Jesus' Little Ones

*Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like little children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. - Matthew 18:3*

Each of us is dear to our Creator; he alone can satisfy the truest needs of our souls, and like little children, each of us needs God's care and guidance and mercy every step. Our Heavenly Father rejoices in pouring out his compassion and grace on those who seek him humbly and reverently, and he calls us his own children of light -

*Therefore, whoever takes the lowly position of this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. And whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me. - Matthew 18:4-5*

Of this, medieval German philosopher Eckhart von Hochheim (approx. 1260-1328, known in history as Meister Eckhart) writes, "Be willing to be a beginner every single morning." Truly, every day we can learn more about God and his nature, and each day holds its own joys and sorrows, so God asks us to walk by faith and let him carry us and teach us each step.

Eckhart wrote of life in this world, "Spirituality is not to be learned by flight from the world . . . Rather, we must learn an inner solitude wherever or with whomsoever we may be. We must learn to penetrate things and find God there." We must face this world's fears and the accuser's snares, yet we are all Jesus' little ones, and he protects us from spiritual foes that are too strong for us -

*If anyone causes one of these little ones—those who believe in me—to stumble . . . Woe to the world because of the things that cause people to stumble! Such things must come, but woe to the person through whom they come. - Matthew 18:6-7*

Eckhart encouraged each believer to learn about God for themselves, and he taught about the value of each soul, as he says, "Every creature is a word of God and is a book about God." For Jesus cares about each of his little ones, regardless of what anyone in this world thinks of us; he is our good Shepherd who watches over us -

*If a man owns a hundred sheep, and one of them wanders away, will he not . . . go to look for the one that wandered off? And if he finds it, truly I tell you, he is happier about that one sheep . . . In the same way your Father in heaven is not willing that any of these little ones should perish. - Matthew 18:12-14*

Eckhart also continually reminds us that God is near with every one of us, so that we can be with our Heavenly Father anytime and anywhere, as he said, "There is no need to look for God here or there. He is no farther away than the door of your own heart." As Jesus also reassures us -

*For where two or three gather in my name, there am I with them. - Matthew 18:20*

It is good to be near God.

## A New Heart & A New Spirit

*In Ezekiel 36, God tells us that he will give us a new heart and a new spirit when we realize our need for him and turn to him humbly. This week, Don Milnor writes about some of the ways that God can help us with our perspectives and attitudes.*

## An Attitude Adjustment

Of course having the right attitude and focus is important for any Christian. This is not something which comes naturally (for many people anyway) or doesn't matter. Satan is a master of marketing, and will convince us that we have it really bad if we let him. However, while we actually have it pretty good, we do need to make efforts to think the best possible ways as a Christian to be joyful.

The book of Philippians is a good passage of Scripture, especially Philippians 4:4-9, to help us to have the attitude we should have.

Keep in mind that Philippians was not written under ideal circumstances, but at the very least, it was written in a difficult situation, when Paul was in a Roman prison, and not everyone away from him was doing what he wanted them to.

Let us look at this passage:

*Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice! Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things. Whatever you have learned or received or heard from me, or seen in me—put it into practice. And the God of peace will be with you. -Philippians 4:4-9*

A few things to note:

Rejoicing is something which we need to do, always, and which Paul even repeated (verse 4).

Paul not only tells us not to be anxious, but as he often does, tells us what we should do in its place. It's much better for us to take a concern before God, than to try to deal with it ourselves, possibly not knowing what we're going to do about it anyway (verses 6-7).

We need to think about the good things, not the bad ones. I wish I had this mastered (verse 8).

While Paul specifically mentions our imitating him here (also mentioned in 1 Cor. 11:1), we can look up to about any mature Christian, and probably find some good things to emulate (verse 9).
