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Clothed With The Imperishable

As was the earthly man, so are those who are of the earth; and as is the heavenly man, so also are those who are of heaven. And just as we have borne the image of the earthly man, so shall we bear the image of the heavenly man.

- 1 Corinthians 15:48-49

We are of the earth, yet Jesus came to make us citizens of heaven. We are mere flesh and blood, yet the Son of God has come from heaven to make us God's own children, and he has prepared an eternal inheritance for those who humbly walk by faith - I declare to you, brothers and sisters, that flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, nor does the perishable inherit the imperishable. - 1 Corinthians 15:50

English poet John Donne (1572-1631) spent most of his younger years travelling and preparing for a diplomatic career. Yet sadness (his wife and three of their children passed away young) and poor health led Donne to devote himself to prayer and understanding the message of Jesus. He became known for his writings about how Jesus has triumphed over sin and death itself.

John writes in one of his best-known poems, "All mankind is of one author, and is one volume; when one man dies, one chapter is not torn out of the book, but translated into a better language", for "No man is an island, entire of itself", so "never send to know for whom the bell tolls; it tolls for thee." For God has called us to put our trust in his promises instead of in this world's ways.

In another poem, John wrote of how Jesus cleanses us with his lifeblood, "Moist with one drop of thy blood, my dry soul shall . . . be freed by that drop", and he expresses the hope this brings to those who put our faith in the good news of Jesus, "May then sin's sleep, and death's soon from me pass, that waked from both, I again risen may salute the last, and everlasting day." Jesus has indeed swallowed up death, so that we may be clothed with the imperishable -

When the perishable has been clothed with the imperishable, and the mortal with immortality, then the saying that is written will come true: Death has been swallowed up in victory. - 1 Corinthians 15:53-54

John Donne also wrote, "Death be not proud, though some have called thee mighty and dreadful, for, thou art not so", for Jesus has given an enduring hope to those who follow him; as Donne writes, "One short sleep past, we wake eternally, And death shall be no more; death, thou shalt die." Jesus has won the victory that human thinking and human strength couldn't have won - The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God! He gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. - 1 Corinthians 15:56-57

Thanks be to our Heavenly Father, for his compassion and grace and wisdom and splendor.

Rebuilding The Ruins

In the Old Testament, Scriptures like Isaiah 58, Isaiah 61, and Amos 9 tell us of God's promises to rebuild the Israelites' ruins. Likewise, God can rebuild the ruins in our hearts and souls when we humbly turn to him and trust in the message of Jesus. This week, Dot Duncan writes about all of the ways that God has repaired and restored each of us.

And Such Were Some of You, But You Were Washed . . .

My sisters and I study the Bible on Monday nights. Currently, we are studying gratitude. One of the assignments we are working on is creating a Praise History. What is a Praise History? A history of events and/or circumstances that have occurred in a person's life. This history included good times and troubled times, things that God helped you through. Circumstances that you can look back on and praise God for bringing you through them.

As I was writing down those things that I thought were significant, I did not include shameful events or circumstances that occurred in my life. I really could not bring myself to be that open and honest with my sisters.

As I recalled some of those events, 1 Corinthians 6:9-11 came to mind. It reads . . . Do you not know that the unrighteous will not inherit or have any share in the kingdom of God? Do not be deceived; neither the sexually immoral, nor idolaters, nor adulterers . . . nor thieves, nor the greedy, nor drunkards . . . will inherit or have any share in the kingdom of God. And such were some of you [before you believed]. But you were washed [by the atoning sacrifice of Christ], you were sanctified [set apart for God, and made holy], you were justified [declared free of guilt] in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ and in the [Holy] Spirit of our God [the source of the believer's new life and changed behavior]. (Amplified Bible)

You see, I found my name listed among the people in I Corinthians 6:9-11 before I came to know Christ. The statement, "And such were some of you" reminded me of God's ability to cleanse us from unrighteousness, then setting us apart for His noble use (making us holy). God wasn't satisfied with just cleaning us up and setting us apart as His people; He decided to give us a full pardon through Christ our Lord. Treating us as though we've never sinned.

One would think that He had done enough! No! He left the Holy Spirit to live in us so that we would share the hope we have in Him with others. The bonus in all of this is one-day Jesus will return to get His righteous ones to live with Him forever.

Writing the Praise History, reminded me of some of the sins I had committed against God. But it also reminded me God can take a ruined life that is on a course of self-destruction, and transform it into a godly one. God can take a ruined life and transform it into the likeness of His Son, Jesus Christ. How do I know? "And such were some of you"!
