In French writer Carmen Bernos de Gasztold's (1919-1995) "Prayers From The Ark", a giraffe thanks God for letting it see things from a higher viewpoint, "Lord, I who see the world above . . . It is easier for me to believe in Your greatness." Similarly, when we seek God with our hearts, he helps us look past this world's appearances, and he places us where we can encourage one another to put our faith in the message of Jesus - If the whole body were an eye, where would the sense of hearing be? . . . But in fact God has placed the parts in the body, every one of them, just as he wanted them to be. - 1 Corinthians 12:17-18

In another of de Gasztold's prayers, a thankful bee appreciates how God gives its life meaning, "May You be blessed who spread the riches of Your sweetness Let my small span of ardent life melt into our great communal task; to lift up to Your glory this temple of sweetness." For God can show us his compassion and splendor through things that seem small by earthly thinking, and through those who seem weak to worldly minds - The eye cannot say to the hand, I don't need you! And the head cannot say to the feet, I don't need you! On the contrary, those parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable.

- 1 Corinthians 12:21-22

In Carmen's "The Creatures' Choir", a humble parrot is aware of its limitations, while offering all it has to God, and prays "If You need me, I am your servant, one who never grows tired repeating the same word again and again . . I may grow tedious, but people listen . . . When may I serve Your infinite wisdom?" ## One Sacrifice For Sins

By one sacrifice for all time, Jesus has made it possible for everyone to come to God with a humble heart and receive forgiveness of all our sins, an eternal home with God, and much more. This week, Don Milnor writes about the vastness of the grace Jesus' sacrifice brings to us.

## How Much Did Our Sin Cost?

The price which Jesus paid for our $\sin$ is not really quantifiable in dollars and cents, but Jesus does tell a parable which may start to give us some idea of how big a deal our sin is, by comparing it to large amounts of money.

I'm going to quote from Matthew 18 here, except I'm going to try to convert to our money. Footnotes in my Bible say that a talent was worth more than 15 years' wages of a laborer (I'll assume 15 years), and that the denarius was a day's wages. I'll assume the worker makes $\$ 10$ an hour after taxes, 8 hours a day, 5 days a week, 50 weeks a year ( 2 unpaid weeks off) to make the math simple: $\$ 20,000$ a year.

Then Peter came and said to Him, "Lord, how often shall my brother sin against me and I forgive him? Up to seven times?" Jesus said to him, "I do not say to you, up to seven times, but up to seventy times seven. For this reason the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his slaves When he had begun to settle them, one who owed him three billion dollars (ten thousand talents) was brought to him. But since he did not have the means to repay, his lord commanded him to be sold, along with his wife and children and all that he had, and repayment to be made. So the slave fell to the ground and prostrated himself before him, saying, 'Have patience with me and I will repay you everything.' And the lord of that slave felt compassion and released him and forgave him the debt."-Matthew 18:21-27

I've read this before and thought, "He...he just forgave him? He didn't have to pay that gigantic amount back at all? He just let him off?" He couldn't pay it anyway. If he worked for 50 years and saved every penny, he would have saved one million dollars, only $1 / 3000^{\text {th }}$ of the debt. He would have to work for 150,000 years to pay it off. Now are you starting to see a little of the concept of eternal punishment?

Each one of us is that debtor. I am, you are, anyone old enough to $\sin$. By one estimate, there have been a total of 117 billion humans who have ever lived on this planet... plus who knows how many more to come in human history. Thankfully, the value of the blood of God in the flesh dying for his wayward creation is.. yes, that big! And so is his great love (Ephesians 2:4); praise God!

But He, having offered one sacrifice for sins for all time... Hebrews 10:12
Oh, a side note: In verses $28-35$, the slave above is owed $\$ 6,000$ ( 100 denarii) by another slave, a lot if you only make $\$ 20,000$ a year, he doesn't forgive him....and gets in a lot of trouble. We need to forgive each other from the heart. After all, we each owe three billion dollars . . .
