## Hosanna In The Highest Heavens



Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, Go to the village ahead of you, and at once you will find a donkey tied there, with her colt by her. - Matthew 21:1-2

As Jesus enters Jerusalem, he comes riding on a humble donkey, instead of on a powerful warhorse; our heavenly King comes in gentleness and compassion, rather than in gaudiness or lavishness - *This took place to fulfill what was spoken through the prophet: Say to Daughter Zion, See, your king comes to you, gentle and riding on a donkey, and on a colt." - Matthew 21:4-5* 

Hymn writer, theologian, and logician Isaac Watts (1674-1748) had his first hymn published at age 20, and he went on to write at least 700 hymns. In his best-known hymn, "Joy To The World", Watts sought to combine the imagery of Psalm 98 with the message of Jesus, to reflect the enduring hope and peace that Jesus brings to those who believe his message.

In the first verse to Isaac's hymn, he expresses the good news that Jesus brings to everyone, as well as God's simple call for us to open our hearts and minds to him, "Joy to the world, the Lord is come . . . Let every heart prepare Him room and Heaven and nature sing." As the crowd prepares the way for Jesus, our Heavenly Father asks us to clear away this world's distractions, so that we can consider the lasting blessings Jesus brings to those who follow him humbly - *A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, while others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road.* - *Matthew 21:8* 

Watts's hymn continues, "Joy to the earth, the Savior reigns Let all their songs employ While fields and floods, rocks, hills and plains Repeat the sounding joy." Truly, Jesus makes our spirits rejoice, and he brings us salvation and eternal life - *The crowd that went ahead of them* . . . *shouted: Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heavens! - Matthew 21:9* 

"Joy To The World" first appeared in a collection of hymns in 1719. In 1742, when classical composer George Frideric Handel's oratorio "Messiah" was first performed, Watts's hymn was re-set to music based on excerpts from "Messiah" (the current tune is a slight revision made in the 1800s). Combined with Handel's music, Isaac's words express God's splendor and his care for us. As Watts writes, "He rules the world with truth and grace And makes the nations prove The glories of his righteousness And wonders of his love." For this is Jesus, our Savior - *When Jesus entered Jerusalem, the whole city was stirred and asked, Who is this? The crowds answered, This is Jesus, the prophet from Nazareth in Galilee. - Matthew 21:10-11* 

He is Jesus, our Lord and Savior, our Alpha and our Omega, our light of life.
