# The Spirit Of God Lives In Us



You . . . are not in the realm of the flesh but are in the realm of the Spirit, if indeed the Spirit of God lives in you. - Romans 8:9

Indeed, the Spirit of God lives in those who open their hearts to Jesus and who follow him humbly; our Heavenly Father cleanses and sanctifies those who trust in the good news of the Lamb of God instead of in this world's empty thinking. God has brought us out of the realm of emptiness and decay, and into the realm of his Spirit, a realm of hope and life -

If Christ is in you... the Spirit gives life... And if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies because of his Spirit who lives in you. - Romans 8:10-11

Italian philosopher and physician Marsilio Ficino (1433-1499) began his career in medicine, and he wrote a number of medical works. He also spent considerable time studying the writings of ancient Greek philosopher Plato, since he was intrigued by Plato's thoughts about what existed beyond this physical universe. Ficino said, "The soul exists partly in eternity and partly in time," yet he found that the philosopher's thoughts fell well short of answering his questions.

Marsilio then realized that only the message of Jesus could meet the deepest needs of our souls, as he writes "The will is satisfied only by that one good beyond which there is no further good. What can this good be except the boundless God?" So when Ficino was about 40, he devoted himself to learning about Jesus and writing about him.

Truly, God's thoughts are boundless and timeless, and the depths of his compassion and understanding are beyond human words to describe fully. Not only does our Father in heaven give us his Spirit, he also calls us his own children -

For those who are led by the Spirit of God are the children of God. - Romans 8:14

Oneness with God can give us lasting hope and meaning, since as Marsilio writes, "The soul longs for unity and harmony." Only God can give us genuine unity and harmony; as Marsilio Ficino also wrote, "The One is infinite, for it is not mixed, divided or incomplete in any way. It is an infinite beauty and an ultimate Good, which therefore calls forth the greatest love. Thus we may come to love God himself." And God also gives us the imperishable inheritance of eternal life -

The Spirit himself testifies with our Spirit that we are God's children. Now if we are children, then we are heirs - heirs of God and co-heirs with Christ, if indeed we share in his sufferings in order that we may also share in his glory. - Romans 8:16-17

## In The Beginning

Genesis teaches us that in the beginning God created the world, the skies, and the seas, and everything in them; and John tells us that in the beginning Jesus was the Word and that he was with God. This week, Paula Robbins writes about the care God put into creating us.

## A Story That Never Ends

The beginning of any story is important and often contains details that recur in the story. The story of God's activity in our world is no different. We find a unique detail about the creation of the first human in Genesis 2:7. God chooses dust as the material for this creature who will bear His image. He presumably adds water since our bodies are 55-60% water in composition. God personally forms the incredibly elegant human body out of...mud. We humans still bear the elegance and the messiness of our creation. Then God gets even more personal. He gives life to this mud form by breathing His breath into Adam's nostrils. God gives a level of attention and care to the creation of the human body that he did not give to anything else.

Tragedy soon enters the story. Genesis 3 describes how Adam and Eve are enticed to sin, to defy God. As God pronounces the Serpent's punishment in Genesis 3:15, He makes the enigmatic statement that one of the woman's offspring will crush Satan's head, destroying his influence. God announced His plan counteract this interruption of His story at this early stage of the story.

After much time and several other predictions of a coming deliverer and redeemer, God puts his plan for redemption into action...by coming to earth in a tiny, vulnerable human body (Luke 1:31-33; 2:6-7). Our creator, who put such tender and personal attention into forming the body, lived in a human body. (Colossians 1:15-20). After living a sinless life (2 Corinthians 5:21; Hebrews 4:15), Jesus allowed the sacrifice of his body (John 10:18). Through the spilling of His blood and death he made atonement for our sins and redeemed us while also giving us the perfect object lesson of God's love, mercy, and justice (Romans 3:23-26; Ephesians 1:7; Hebrews 10:10: 1 Peter 2: 22-24). All this while confined to all the limitations of a body like ours.

But he wasn't finished. Three days after he died, he was alive again...in a new type of body. He was recognizable as himself, participated in human activities like eating, and still bore the wounds that caused his death (Luke 24:36-43). But he now inhabited a body that could not die (Romans 6:9;) and in which he returned to God's presence (Luke 24:51).

But His story isn't over. We have been promised that those who put their faith in Jesus have been united with Him in His death and will be united with him in a resurrection like His (Romans 6:3-5). Humans are designed to exist in a body, but our corruptible bodies are not able to lie in God's presence. After our corruptible bodies die, we will live on in incorruptible bodies like that of Jesus (1 Corinthians 15). A body that cannot be affected by sin and is fit for God's presence. A body in which we will live on the new earth, eternally free from death, pain, and all other effects of sin (Revelation 21:1-4).

The human body has been and always will be a central part of God's story. We are each invited to allow God to weave our story into His. When we put our faith in Him, we are part of His story of perfect love and perfect justice. We are part of a beautiful story that never ends.
