In Everyone It Is The Same God At Work

There are different kinds of gifts, but the same Spirit distributes them. There are different kinds of service, but the same Lord. - 1 Corinthians 12:4-5

This world constantly makes comparisons, and worldly minds routinely decide who is important and who isn't; yet the Lord reminds us to set aside this kind of futile thinking, and instead to learn to appreciate one another and to learn that God is at work in each one of us in the body of Jesus
There are different kinds of working, but in all of them and in everyone it is the same God at work. - 1 Corinthians 12:6

Prairie dogs are small (about 12 inches long), vulnerable animals that work together to produce a community that none of them could have made by themselves. Prairie dogs are related to squirrels; they live on the wide-open grasslands of North America, and they are known for the underground "prairie dog towns" they build together. Our Heavenly Father makes prairie dogs' paws ideally equipped for digging, and he also teaches them to do this

together.

A prairie dog town contains a complex of tunnels (with emergency exits), rooms for specific purposes (including sleeping areas, a nursery, and a food storage area), and air vents. As these small mammals can make all this in harmony, God calls us to learn to appreciate one another and to care for one another. Whatever abilities God gives us, they are given for the common good -

Now to each one the manifestation of the Spirit is given for the common good. - 1 Corinthians 2:7

When prairie dogs graze, they take turns as sentinels, and at other times some will be tending the nursery or gathering food for the others. Researchers have also identified specific "bridge animals" that communicate with other prairie dog towns. Similarly, God reminds us that all of our abilities come from him alone, and whether they are knowledge, or faith, or healing others spiritually, or listening patiently, or encouraging, each of them is valuable to him -

To one there is given through the Spirit a message of wisdom . . . to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by that one Spirit . . . - 1 Corinthians 12:8-9

Prairie dogs are very good communicators; they make a variety of sounds, including yips, chirps, and barks; and each "town" has specific sounds for the animals and hazards they are likely to encounter. Similarly, God teaches us truths that we could have barely grasped on our own, and he enables us to speak his truths to one another as well as to those who need to hear them. This too is the work of his Spirit, who lives in everyone who walks humbly in the light of Jesus -

All these are the work of one and the same Spirit, and he distributes them to each one, just as he determines. - 1 Corinthians 12:11

Whatever human minds might think of us, each of us is equally precious to our Father in heaven.

The End In The Beginning

For the last three years or so, I've been reflecting on Genesis 1-3 and the relationship between God and his creation. I read of the beauty of that garden, the simplicity of God's relationship with his people, and the "utopia" experience that existed. I then look at present day, and I'm forced to wonder how it all went wrong and how we ever get back to the beginning experience.

The "how it all went wrong" part is not too hard to comprehend: sin. Sin messed everything up. Death, pain, broken relationships, all of that is due to sin. Read Genesis 3 and it's clear many of the problems we experience today are due to the sin of eating of the tree that was forbidden. But what about how we get back to that beginning experience? That too, is thankfully answered in Scripture: Jesus and his sacrifice and resurrection. Because of the work of Jesus, the beauty of what was in the garden will one day be available to us again.

The awe of Revelation seems to replicate the awe of the beginning moments of the garden of Eden. Because of Jesus, we will be restored in our relationship with God and the beauty of heaven will redeem the brokenness of earth. No more will the earth cause us hardship. No more will men and women be at odds with one another. No more will Satan whisper his deceptions. No more will there be spiritual war. There will be peace. There will be victory. There will be a new heaven and new earth because of Jesus.

I began to weep loudly because no one was found worthy to open the scroll or to look into it. And one of the elders said to me, "Weep no more; behold, the Lion of the tribe of Judah, the Root of David, has conquered, so that he can open the scroll and its seven seals." (Revelation 5:4-5)

We may not know what that scroll is or all the details of Revelation, but we know Jesus is the answer. Jesus can save us. Jesus can redeem us. And that gives us hope.
