Daniel has found himself in peril because the king of Babylon has become enraged at

The commander . . . had gone out to put to death the wise men of Babylon . . . Daniel

went in to the king and asked for time, so that he might interpret the dream for him. -

Daniel has found himself in peril because the king of Babylon has become enraged at his counselors and experts when they couldn't explain the king's dream. Yet Daniel acts calmly:

Then Daniel returned to his house and explained the matter to his friends. - Daniel 2:17

In Edgar Allan Poe's story "The Purloined Letter", Poe's detective Auguste Dupin is consulted on an urgent case by the Prefect of police. A compromising letter has been stolen, and this has led to serious problems. The police are convinced that they know who has the letter, but they haven't found it. Dupin wants to concentrate without any distractions, and says, "We shall examine it to better purpose in the dark." Similarly, God also asks us to clear our minds of any preconceptions.

The Prefect doesn't understand the detective's approach: "That is another of your odd notions, said the Prefect, who had a fashion of calling everything 'odd' that was beyond his comprehension." Similarly, this world considers it "odd" when believers turn to prayer before making key decisions, and considers it "odd" to trust in God. Yet this is what Daniel does in a critical situation:

He urged them to plead for mercy from the God of heaven concerning this mystery, so that he and his friends might not be executed with the rest of the wise men of Babylon. - Daniel 2:18

In Edgar's story, the police have thoroughly searched the suspect's home, even taking apart all of his furniture, looking for a secret hiding place. So Dupin takes a different approach; he learns about the suspect's devious habits, and he advises the others to reason "As a poet and as a mathematician." Indeed, human logic can only lead us so far, yet when we combine it with seeking God's spiritual guidance, our Heavenly Father can help us see his truths more clearly:

During the night the mystery was revealed to Daniel in a vision. Then Daniel . . . said: Praise be to the name of God for ever and ever; wisdom and power are his. - Daniel 2:20

Auguste Dupin is now ready to visit the suspect's home. He soon finds the crucial letter hiding in plain sight, in a rack on a wall. Likewise, the answers to the most important questions are right in front of us all, for God's words and the message of Jesus tell us things that human minds couldn't ever have thought of:

He reveals deep and hidden things . . . you have made known to me what we asked of you, you have made known to us the dream of the king. - Daniel 2:22-23

As God revealed the mystery to Daniel, Jesus reveals to everyone the answers to our deepest needs.

Bring Your Serving A-Game

What's your favorite way to serve? Are you a "come early and set up the tables and chairs" kind of person, are you a "make the food" kind of person, are you a "send cards to everyone for everything" person, are you a "teach the preschool age class" person? Something else? I think you get the point . . .

There are endless ways to serve in and with the church. And not every member enjoys serving in the same ways. My husband, for example, will be the first to say yes when asked to help set up, tear down, or help move things. Anything physically laborious, he's happy to help! But he would be mortified at the thought of being asked to teach a class. Me? Setting up tables before or sweeping floors after a large gathering sounds positively not fun, but I will without hesitation sign up to cook food for the bridal shower or funeral meal, or teach a class.

And the good news is, the church needs us both! The church needs all the different types of servants there are. Not to say that it would be okay for us to refuse filling a need in the church just because it doesn't suit our preferred "style" of serving. But it is definitely okay to volunteer in ways that you enjoy volunteering, when there are needs in those areas. 1 Peter 4:10 tells us that each person has unique gifts that should be used to serve others.

Regardless of where you serve, God asks for pure motives and loving intentions. There is no shortage of scriptures that remind us of this. Galatians 5:13 tells us to "serve one another through love," while Philippians 2:3-4 reminds us to always serve others with humility, and not for selfish gain. God knows our heart, as 1 Samuel 16:7 tells us, and He knows when our intentions are not aligned with what He asks of us when it comes to serving others.

So whether you are a "set up the tables" kind of person, or a "teach Bible class for toddlers" kind of person, the church needs you. And even more than that, God needs your heart to be in it for real. So put your gifts to use, and bring God your A-game!
