All You Who Are Weary & Burdened

This world's loud voices and chaos can weary us, and its sorrows and fears can be a burden to our souls, yet Jesus gives us rest and refuge when we come to him:

... and I will give you rest. - Matthew 11:28

German hymnist Katharina Amalia von Schlegel (1697-1768) lived in a small princedom that had been devastated in the Thirty Years War, and that was still struggling to rebuild. She not only put her faith in God, she also wrote numerous hymns about the peace and hope that we can get from putting our trust in Jesus.

Von Schlegel's best-known hymn, "Be Still, My Soul", reflects the spiritual blessings Jesus gave her. She writes, "Leave to thy God to order and provide; in every change, He faithful will remain. Be still, my soul: thy best, thy heavenly friend through thorny ways leads to a joyful end." Our Father in heaven knows everything we endure in this world, and through Jesus he comforts us when we turn our hearts to him:

Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart . . . - Matthew 11:29

For over a century, Katharina's hymns were unknown outside of her homeland. Scottish linguist Jane Borthwick (1813-1897) often searched for untranslated hymns, and the words of von Schlegel's hymn moved her to translate it. The hymn continues, "Be still, my soul: thy God doth undertake to guide the future, as He has the past. Thy hope, thy confidence let nothing shake; all mysterious now shall be bright at last." Truly, God's thoughts and the message of Jesus transcend this world's temporary appearances and circumstances, and he alone can give us rest for our souls:

... and you will find rest for your souls. - Matthew 11:29

Borthwick's English translation was soon set to a portion of music that had been previously written by Finnish classical music composer Jean Sibelius. The melody was originally written to call to mind the natural beauty and peace of Finland's vast forests; in the hymn, it reminds us of the even greater beauty of Jesus' message and the deeper peace we can get from following him humbly.

As Katharina von Schlegel's hymn concludes, "Acknowledge Him in all they words and ways, so shall He view thee with a well-pleased eye. Be still, my soul: the Sun of life divine through passing clouds shall but more brightly shine." Jesus is our light of life:

For my yoke is easy and my burden is light. - Matthew 11:30

God's Spirit lives in us, and our Heavenly Father guides us and sustains us every step.

Jesus Has Overcome The World

In John 16, as Jesus is about to go to the cross, he reassures the disciples that he has overcome this world, though not in the way they might have expected. Jesus has indeed overcome this world's fears, its harshness, its snares, and much more. This week, Caleb Dillinger writes about how Jesus overcame the world, and what this means for us.

Overcome By The Blood Of The Lamb

I grew up listening to contemporary Christian music, and Jeremy Camp was someone I was introduced to early on. While I enjoyed his music, things took on deeper meaning as I learned his story. He married Melissa when he was 22, she was 20. She died of cancer at age 21. While Jeremy remarried a few years later, his love for Melissa and the hurt he experienced powered many of his songs. "You have restored me, from my feeble and broken soul" was a line he wrote in 2004, just three years after Melissa's death. How could Jeremy feel restored? Because Jesus overcomes the world.

In 2010, 9 years after her death, Jeremy wrote another song, "Overcome." This was based on Revelation 12:11, which says,

And they overcame him by the blood of the Lamb and by the word of their testimony...

The "him" in question is Satan (Rev. 12:9). Satan has been called "ruler of the world" (John 12, 14, 16). As this bulletin series points out, Jesus has overcome the world (John 16:33). That means all that is wrong in this world, all the sin, the death, the hurt, the power of Satan, that is overcome (triumphed over!). John, the same writer of the gospel of John, specifies that Satan himself is overcome by the blood of the lamb.

We keep the words of our testimony flowing, from generation to generation, from believer to believer because we believe in the power of that blood to overcome. It already has, and it will continually, overcome the world, Satan and all evil. Truly church, "We" have now overcome, all because of Jesus. Seek refuge in him today for anything that troubles you. Jesus will never disappoint.
