The Wisdom That Comes From Heaven

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June 22, 2025 Volume 34, Number 25 Who is wise and understanding among you? - James 3:13

We all understand so little, yet God considers wise those who simply put their faith in the message of Jesus, instead of in human thinking and human abilities. We are all sheep who need a Shepherd, yet God considers us wise when we walk humbly in the grace, truth, and compassion of Jesus:

... show it by their good life, by deeds done in the humility that comes from wisdom. - James 3:13

In Norton Juster's 1961 children's fantasy novel "The Phantom Tollbooth", young Milo is bored and restless, until he finds a package addressed to him. It contains a map of places he's never heard of, and instructions to assemble a tollbooth. Milo follows the directions, and he is suddenly transported to the Kingdom of Wisdom, where he meets his guide, Tock. Things are not well in this unusual land; it has split into two chaotic kingdoms, for two brothers have become rival kings.

One kingdom is Dictionopolis, where everyone talks endlessly about words; the other kingdom is Digitopolis, where people talk only about numbers. Despite plenty of activity in each, neither has found any meaning or hope. They are also threatened by the demons of ignorance and insincerity. Likewise, this world is full of human teachings and schemes that produce little of lasting value. God calls us to set aside human preconceptions and human ambitions, to look beyond this world's circumstances and appearances, and instead to open our hearts and minds to Jesus' message:

If you harbor bitter envy and selfish ambition in your hearts, do not boast about it . . . Such "wisdom" does not come down from heaven . . . there you find disorder and every evil practice. - James 3:14-16

Milo learns that the kingdom used to live in peace because of two princesses, Pure Reason and Sweet Rhyme, who had mediated between the rivalrous brothers. The two kings each thought they were always right, so eventually they became frustrated with the princesses, and had them imprisoned. Similarly, logic and factual knowledge by themselves are of little value. So, our Heavenly Father calls us to combine them with the sweetness of his truths that comfort our spirits, along with the pure reason of the Scriptures, and to speak the truth with mercy and kindness:

But the wisdom that comes from heaven is first of all pure; then peaceloving, considerate, submissive, full of mercy and good fruit, impartial and sincere. -James 3:17

After getting help, Milo and Tock are able to release Rhyme and Reason, restoring harmony. When Milo gets home, he is disappointed when the tollbooth disappears, yet soon he sees many treasures he had overlooked. He now enjoys reading, and watching the clouds, trees and more.

Peacemakers who sow in peace reap a harvest of righteousness. - James 3:18

For God desires to gives us a harvest of peace, genuine joy, righteousness, and much more.

Jesus Has Overcome The World

In John 16, as Jesus is about to go to the cross, he reassures the disciples that he has overcome this world, though not in the way they might have expected. Jesus has indeed overcome this world's fears, its harshness, its snares, and much more. This week, Donna Smith writes about how Jesus helps us overcome this world's fears and troubles when we put our faith in him.

Take Heart

But take heart! I have overcome the world. - John 16:33

I can remember being young, naive, and very trusting. If the phone rang at three in the morning, which it rarely did, I simply woke up and groggily answered it. I talked, even laughed, for a few minutes with whichever of my friends and or relatives that were calling and quickly fell back to sleep. There was no period of deep distress or dread prior to picking up the phone. It always seemed to be a small, real or imagined, crisis which was often solved by a few minutes of conversation.

As I've matured this has changed. Just last week the phone rang at three in the morning. In the time prior to answering it, which had to only have been a few seconds, I remember experiencing fear, dread, sorrow and anxiety. If you're asking, yes, I am a Christian. However, thoughts of Jesus, the scriptures, His promises, only came to mind after I answered the phone. In those few moments prior to answering, I was simply a person dreading answering, overcome by sorrow, feeling that all my friends were sleeping, and Lord please not one more thing. (To quote a good friend, "If it's not one thing its two.")

That following Wednesday I had the privilege to hear a talk on Jesus in Gethsemane. Jesus spoke some things which gave me courage and hope. The same Jesus who in John 16:33 said "I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world." also said in Matthew 26:38... "My soul is overwhelmed with sorrow to the point of death. Stay here and keep watch with me." Also, like me with my friends, Jesus was disappointed that his disciples seemed to be asleep at a time when he needed support. (Matthew 26:45) Jesus also asked the Father if it were possible not to have to go through what he was going to have to go through. (Matthew 26:42) I was comforted by the fact that Jesus submitted to God's will but was willing, if possible, to not have to go through what was to follow.

In Luke 22:43 we are told an angel from heaven appeared to Jesus and strengthened him through his period of agony. As for me, was my phone call good news? No, it was not. However, almost immediately following it, I received an encouraging text containing scriptures which strengthened me. We can read in Matthew, Luke and John and know that Jesus completed what he needed to overcome the world, and he also made it possible for you and me to do so as well. 1John 5:4 - For everyone born of God overcomes the world. This is the victory that has overcome the world, even our faith.
