American coots (also called mud hens) live in marshes, ponds, and other calm bodies of water. Most of their diet comes from aquatic plants, which they find on the surface, or by diving, or by foraging on muddy ground. They are somewhat smaller than ducks (average size 14-15 inches long), though they are not closely related to ducks.

Their feet are ingeniously designed for their environment; instead of webbed feet, their toes have large lobes that they use for swimming (when they swim, their heads often bob back and forth). The lobes also give them extra stability and support when they walk or stand in wet or muddy places. Moreover, the lobes fold up while their feet are raised, making walking easier.

When American coots take flight, their feet give them extra leverage. They start takeoff by flapping their wings as they "run" several yards across the water surface; this can look rather comical, yet it is an efficient use of energy from both their feet and wings. The Creator who caringly designs these birds' unusual feet also gives us life and breath and everything else:

The God who made the world and everything in it is the Lord of heaven and earth and does not live in temples built by human hands . . . Rather, he himself gives everyone life and breath and everything else. - Acts 17:24-25

American coots are friendly birds, living in large groups, and coot parents work closely together in making their nests. They build them on water hidden among tall aquatic plants, and they anchor the nests with reeds, cattails, and sedges. Then, when the eggs hatch, they build new, more spacious nests suitable for their chicks.

Similarly, God knows our thoughts and our hearts, and he knows our deepest needs. Even before we knew him, he showed us his care for us, in the hope that each of us would seek him humbly:

God did this so that they would seek him and perhaps reach out for him and find him. - Acts 17:27

Truly, God pours out spiritual blessings on those who believe in Jesus and hold fast to him.

Like A Mustard Seed

In Matthew 13 and Mark 4, Jesus compares God's kingdom with a small mustard seed, for God can take the smallest of beginnings, nurture it, and make it grow. This week, Cale Dillinger writes about some examples of this from the Scriptures, and then how this idea can help us.

Little To Big

"One raindrop raises the sea." That's a line from a BBC miniseries "Dinotopia", where people live with dinosaurs and value every human life, believing each individual person makes an impact on the greater good. I've loved that little series since I was a child, but particularly love that line and thinking: while each individual seems insignificant, while each small act seems small, there is big/significant impact that can be found at the end/later.

I think of Acts 1:15, the 120 people in the upper room with Peter as they appointed Matthias as the next apostle. I think of the one Ethiopian who is baptized in our Bible (Acts 8) and how today the whole country is Christian in national faith. I think of the one Jew Moses who stood against Pharaoh (albeit with the power of God) and changed the course of the world. I think of the few loaves and fish used to feed thousands. I think of the few (8) people on the ark that transformed the world. I think of the singular sin of Adam and Even that lead to what we experience today. I think of Jesus saying "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few" (Matthew 9:37).

We can find many little to big stories and impacts in the Bible. The faith of a mustard seed is just one of many teachings of God that He doesn't need much. He just needs you. Your trust, your faith, your commitment, your belief. If you can surrender to God, He in His strength can take care of the rest.

You may wonder, "What can I do at Northland? I'm just one person." You may wonder, "How does our church affect Columbus? We're just one church." You may wonder, "How do my single small decisions have big impacts?" The answer will always be, "Because of God." That's the "how." Through God, because of God, the little can be big. The little often will become big. Not by your strength or ingenuity. But by God's power. Put your faith in God, as small as a mustard seed even, and watch God do big things. Little faith turns into big effects. Trust in the Lord God.
