Our Heavenly Father, the God of peace, makes an everlasting covenant with those who follow his Son. We were wandering sheep who needed a shepherd, so God sent Jesus to be our good Shepherd:

... who through the blood of the eternal covenant brought back from the dead our Lord Jesus, that great Shepherd of the sheep . . . - Hebrews 13:20

The Pallas's cat is a small feline that lives in the rocky, high altitude plains and shrublands of Central Asia. God has ideally designed them to live in this harsh, remote habitat. Pallas's cats are roughly the size of a familiar house cat, yet they look somewhat larger since they are covered with thick, fluffy fur.

They face extreme temperature swings, as in the summer it can reach 90 degrees, and in winter it can be -40 degrees or lower. In the summer, they shed much of their fluff, and in the winter they regain their thick coats. They also have heavily furred tails, which they stand on when their feet need extra warmth. Likewise, God equips us to live in this world's changing circumstances and appearances, for his words are always true, and his promises are always trustworthy:

... equip you with everything good for doing his will ... - Hebrews 13:21

Pallas's cats are resourceful in finding food, yet at the same time they face threats from several larger predators. So God designs their bodies ingeniously. Their heads are flattened, their ears are low-set, and they have short legs. Thus, they can peer over a boulder or over a snowbank without being seen, and this also enables them to slip into narrow rocky crevices to escape danger. As God gives all this care to these small cats, even more so he gives us everything we need to follow Jesus, even in this world's spiritual dangers and distractions:

. . . and may he work in us what is pleasing to him, through Jesus Christ. - Hebrews 13:21

The fur of Pallas's cats is a mix of grays and browns, camouflaging them when they're among rocks. When they are caught in the open, they flatten their bodies to resemble rocks. Pallas's cats are slow and vulnerable, yet when they use the resources God gives them, they can live safely. Similarly, God cautions us to avoid this world's teachings, and to put all our hope and faith in him and in the message of Jesus, so that he can strengthen our hearts with his grace:

Do not be carried away by all kinds of strange teachings. It is good for our hearts to be strengthened by grace. - Hebrews 13:9

God's grace overflows to those who humbly and reverently walk in the light of Jesus.

Finnish poet and hymnwriter Anders Achrenius (he is also known as Antti Achrenius) was also well known as a teacher and public speaker about the message of Jesus. Many of his hymns still appear in Finnish hymnals, though only a few of them have been translated into English.

Like A Mustard Seed

In Matthew 13 and Mark 4, Jesus compares God's kingdom with a small mustard seed, for God can take the smallest of beginnings, nurture it, and make it grow. This week, Dot Duncan writes about the ways God can help our "mustard seed faith" grow, when we seek him and trust him.

How to Increase Your Mustard Seed Faith

Several years ago, I facilitated etiquette workshops and classes for groups and individuals. Though these workshops taught basic etiquette, there was so much more the participants could have learned in an advanced etiquette class. However, I cannot remember one participant asking about an advanced class.

Luke 17:5-6 states, The apostles said to the Lord, "Increase our faith!" And the Lord said, "If you had faith like a grain of mustard seed, you could say to this mulberry tree, 'Be uprooted and planted in the sea,' and it would obey you.

Amidst Jesus' teaching, the apostles had the audacity to ask Christ to increase their faith (v 5).

Jesus does not skip a beat, and answers them (v 6).

I believe Jesus is telling the apostles, since I'm the author of faith, stick with me, I'll take your small faith multiply it into a faith that will transform your lives and the lives of others. You will experience the miraculous.

How you can increase your faith in Him

Ask God to multiply the mustard seed faith that He has placed in you.

Make a daily habit of studying God's word, praying, and take action when necessary. Commit your ways to the Lord and watch the transformation occur.

Ask God to help you go beyond where you are right now. Then wait to see and experience the miraculous power of Christ in your life.

As Christians, we can become stuck at the basic level of faith and never reach our full potential. Just as a participant in the advanced etiquette class must commit him/herself to going beyond the basics. We must commit the time and energy to growing our faith in Christ. For we have a God who is willing to take the mustard seed faith He has given us and make the ordinary extra-ordinary.
