# By Faith In The Son Of God

A person is not justified by the works of the law, but by faith in Jesus Christ. - Galatians instead of in human efforts. We couldn't have justified ourselves with our deeds or Galatians 2:16

knowledge, yet through the cross the Lamb of God has justified those who believe his message and follow him humbly: So we, too, have put our faith in Christ Jesus that we may be justified by faith in Christ

and not by the works of the law, because by the works of the law no one will be justified. -

British ambassador, economist, and writer John Bowring (1792-1872) was well-known in his lifetime for his numerous accomplishments, including his diplomatic achievements and his familiarity with many nations and languages. Yet today he is remembered for the hymns he wrote, several of which still often appear in hymnals. In one of his bestremembered hymns, "In The Cross Of Christ I Glory", Bowring reflects on what he had seen on his extensive travels.

John had seen the ruins of once-strong cities, he had been to once-powerful nations that had fallen on hard times, and he compared them with the timeless message of Jesus. The hymn begins, "In the cross of Christ I glory, towering over the wrecks of time; all the light of sacred story gathers round its head sublime." Truly, worldly thinking and human ambitions lead to little; yet centuries later, Jesus still lives within those who follow him with a humble heart:

I have been crucified with Christ and I no longer live, but Christ lives in me. - Galatians

Bowring's hymn compares this world's empty promises and its false hopes with Jesus' trustworthy promises, as he writes, "When the woes of life overtake me - hopes deceive, and fears annoy, never shall the cross forsake me, lo - it glows with peace and joy." Indeed, Jesus and his message of forgiveness and eternal life are the same yesterday, today, and forever:

The life I now live in the body, I live by faith in the Son of God . . . Galatians 2:20

As a public official, John had experienced both successes and failures. In his hymn, he writes about how Jesus gives us lasting hope and peace that transcend this world's changing circumstances: "Bane and blessing, pain and pleasure, by the cross are sanctified; peace is there that knows no measure, joys that through all time abide."

On the cross, Jesus poured out his lifeblood and his compassion for us, and he gave himself so that everyone would be able to approach God with a humble heart to receive the grace we all need:

... who loved me and gave himself for me. - Galatians 2:20

Jesus is our Alpha and our Omega, our Lord and Savior, and much more.

## Like A Mustard Seed

In Matthew 13 and Mark 4, Jesus compares God's kingdom with a small mustard seed, for God can take the smallest of beginnings, nurture it, and make it grow. This week, Micah Evans writes about some Scriptures that have encouraged her to put her "mustard seed" in God's hands.

## A Little Becomes Much

God knows exactly how hard it might be sometimes for us to have faith. He understands our human limitations, and he understands the challenges we face in the weariness of our flesh. Jesus specifically lived this very life we are living, to even more deeply empathize with our humanness. And He reveals to us in Matthew 17:20 that in our humanness, if all we can possibly muster is faith the size of a mustard seed, that's enough to move a whole mountain.

This is significant because a mustard seed is so very tiny. We're not talking peach pit here...we're talking so tiny that you could literally hold thousands of them in your hand. All you need for the God of the universe to allow mountains to move in your life, is to have faith in Him that is barely bigger than the tip of a pencil. And when I am walking through the challenges of life, that is so comforting because sometimes that's about all I can come up with. I am thankful that God doesn't require me to always have a mountain -sized faith! He requires that whatever we have, we give to Him - even if it doesn't seem like much. And He can and will do the rest.

We see this theme of a little becoming much throughout the Bible. In Luke 21:1-4, Jesus saw a widow giving to the temple 2 measly coins, which was all she had, and Jesus commended her for giving all she could come up with even when it wasn't much. We of course see this in the feeding of the 5000 as well, where 5 loaves and 2 fish became enough to feed a massive crowd (Matthew 14:13-21). Just like with our mustard seed of faith, God can do great and mighty things with our very little. So I encourage you to give Him what you have, even if it feels like your last bit of pocket change or your small sack lunch. You might just see some mountains move!
