A City Where We Could Settle



Let the redeemed of the Lord tell their story. - Psalm 107:2

The Lord redeems those who open their minds and hearts to the good news of Jesus, and he has gathered his scattered sheep from all over the world:

Those he gathered from the lands, from east and west, from north and south. - Psalm 107:3

Leo Tolstoy's 1869 novel "War And Peace" is set in the Napoleonic Wars of the early 1800s. The lengthy story has many characters and events. One sub-plot involves two Russian friends, Pierre Bezukhov and Andrei Bolkonsky, as each of them looks for meaning and direction for their lives. Though Russia is fighting against France, Pierre and Andrei both have considerable admiration for French leader Napoleon Bonaparte, for different reasons.

Pierre is a naïve idealist who believes in helping others; he believes Napoleon's promise to fulfill the original ideals of the French Revolution. Andrei is a hardened cynic who sees life as a battle, and he admires Bonaparte's skill and success. So, each one overlooks all of the bloodshed and devastation the revolution and the wars have caused. Each of them will learn later that God alone can satisfy our deepest needs, and the message of Jesus can alone give our lives lasting meaning:

Some wandered in desert wastelands, finding no way to a city where they could settle. They were hungry and thirsty, and their lives ebbed away. - Psalm 107:4-5

When they meet again, Pierre's trust in grand plans and human promises has led to some painful experiences. He now realizes that genuine love means loving God and others daily, in ways that others may never know about. Andrei has attained glory, but he is friendless and empty. He has seen extensive human suffering that has led him to have compassion, as he says, "Compassion . . . for those who love us and for those who hate us . . . that love which God preached on earth."

Each of them turns to God, the one source of enduring compassion, peace and hope. Similarly, God has made us part of his spiritual city, where we may find rest for our souls:

Then they cried out to the Lord in their trouble . . . He led them by a straight way to a city where they could settle. - Psalm 107:6-7

Pierre summarizes what they have both learned, "Life is God . . . while there is life, there is joy in consciousness of the divine. To love life is to love God. Harder and more blessed than all else is to love . . . amidst one's sufferings." Indeed, it is good to give thanks to God for his unfailing love:

Where Does Wisdom Come From?

In Job 28, as he is enduring a painful time, Job ponders the true source of knowledge and wisdom. It is also good for us to remind ourselves that all genuine wisdom comes from God. This week, Peggy Kaiser writes about a parable that reassures us that spiritual wisdom is available to everyone equally when we believe the message of Jesus.

Spiritual Wisdom Available To Everyone Who Believes

When I was in high school, I wanted to be wise and smart even more so than popular or pretty. I earned good grades in high school only because I studied and turned in homework assignments. I never felt academically smart. I really admire people who wise and can speak eloquently on any topic. We all know those people who just seem to be born with wisdom and discernment, people like Benjamin Franklin, Socrates, Ghandi and Master Yoda. They know how to make decisions based on experience, facts and thoughtful judgement. They are not swayed by emotions or the opinions of others. If you don't fall into that category of being naturally wise, there is good news for those of us who feel like we lack the gift of wisdom. Jesus tells us that we can be like a wise man. How can this be?

According to Matthew 7:24, "Therefore everyone who hears these words of mine and puts them into practice is like a wise man who built his house on the rock." Applying Jesus' teachings to my life, leads to a very important type of wisdom; a spiritual wisdom. This wisdom develops a strong foundation in my life. Jesus' words help me figure out the way that he wants me to lead my life, the right things to think about and how to use my resources. I want to have a strong foundation in my life, so that I can weather the storms of life, not only for myself but to be a blessing for others. I do not want to be like the foolish man in this parable. The foolish man did not hear Jesus' word, and was only concerned about himself. This produces a weak foundation that will easily crumble when storms arrive.

Some people are naturally gifted with intelligence and wisdom. God makes spiritual wisdom available to everyone who hears and obeys Jesus' teachings. This parable encourages me, and I hope it encourages your heart as well.
