The Lord Will Not Grow Tired Or Weary

The Lord alone is God in the heavens above and on the earth below. Our living God does not grow tired or weary, and his grace flows abundantly to those who walk humbly in the light of Jesus. Truly, his understanding transcends human thinking:

He will not grow tired or weary, and his understanding no one can fathom. - Isaiah 40:28

The fastest running animal in North America is the pronghorn, a mammal that resembles an antelope (they are often called pronghorn antelopes, though biologists consider them to be part of a different family). Pronghorns average about 3 feet tall at their shoulders, and they average about 4 1/2 feet long. They live in open plains in Western Canada, the Western U.S., and Central Mexico.

On the plains, pronghorns face extreme temperature swings. Their hairs are hollow, providing an unusual form of insulation, so they can live in temperatures ranging from -50 to 130 degrees. Pronghorns face many other dangers, and their defenses are speed, endurance, and alertness. As God enables these animals to live amidst many perils, he renews our weary minds with his words, and he strengthens our fearful hearts with his grace and his presence:

He gives strength to the weary and increases the power of the weak. - Isaiah 40:29

Pronghorns' eyes are quite large, they have a wide field of vision, and they can see for over 3 miles, so they are fully aware of their surroundings. Their legs are designed for running; and their hooves are natural "shock absorbers", with long pointed toes and extra cushioning. Young pronghorns are ready to run soon after birth. They can walk within a half hour, on their second day they can outrun humans, and after a week they are faster than horses. Similarly, when we stay close with Jesus, God renews us inwardly, he lifts us up when we stumble, and he gives us a lasting hope:

Even youths grow tired and weary, and young men stumble and fall; but those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. - Isaiah 40:30-31

God designs the pronghorn ingeniously for both speed and endurance. It can run at 60 miles per hour for short distances, or it can run at 45 mph for a mile, or it can run at 35 mph for 4 miles or more. This capacity comes from their large hearts, lungs, and windpipes, and a large volume of blood for their body size. Likewise, our Heavenly Father keeps our spirits from becoming weary as we endure this world's confusion and harshness, and he protects us and sustains us each step:

They will soar on wings like eagles;

they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint. - Isaiah 40:31

The Lord does not grow tired or weary, and his promises are trustworthy.

Where Does Wisdom Come From?

In Job 28, as he is enduring a painful time, Job ponders the true source of knowledge and wisdom. It is also good for us to remind ourselves that all genuine wisdom comes from God. This week, Caleb Dillinger writes about the human search for wisdom, and how God is the true source of wisdom.

Wisdom From The Living God

When Job reflects on where wisdom comes from in Job 28, as he ponders the place of understanding (vs 12), he comes to the conclusion in verse 13 that "it is not found in the land of the living." But if it is not found in the land of the living, where is it found? Scripture concludes that wisdom is found with the living God.

The gospels reveal Jesus teaching about the living God (Matt. 22 and 26, Mark 12, and Luke 20). But of particular relevance to this discussion of wisdom, I turn to Paul and Barnabas interacting with the people of Lystra in Acts 14. When they are being worshipped as Greek gods, they cry out, "Why are you doing these things? We also are men, of like nature with you, and we bring you good news, that you should turn from these vain things to a living God, who made the heaven and the earth and the sea and all that is in them. (Acts 14:15). Why go to false gods? There is no use turning to idols, to use the language of Habakkuk 2. You should turn to the living God for wisdom.

To connect wisdom and understanding back to the living God, I'll direct you to Deuteronomy 4, what is called the "Shema", the "Hear, O Israel, love the Lord your God . . . " passage. Look at Deuteronomy 4:5-6:

See, I have taught you statutes and rules, as the LORD my God commanded me, that you should do them in the land that you are entering to take possession of it. Keep them and do them, for that will be your wisdom and your understanding in the sight of the peoples, who, when they hear all these statutes, will say, 'Surely this great nation is a wise and understanding people.'

Listening to the wise God, obeying his teachings, that is what leads to wisdom and understanding. Wisdom is not found among the land of the living, but in the living God.
